

in the newly drawn 14th District as they might seem.

Both cities are at the far western end of the 14th, which also includes Southfield, Southfield, Southfield Township, Franklin, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farns, Huntington Woods, Pleasant Ridge, Hazel Fark, Lathrup Village, Ferndale, Oak Fack, Royal Oak Township and Pleasant Ridge, Jacobs points out the Farmington area is ethnically and economically diverse.

'I see it as a microcosm of the larger

district," said the Huntington
Woods Democrat, who currently


