It's a really fun place to be. Maybe, above all else, the kids in our program deserve this type of success.
Eric Halberstadt, who rushed for 137 yards on 25 carries, scored both touchdowns on runs of 2 and 4 yards in the first and second quarters, respectively. The Falcons were stopped on downs at the Polar Bears' 1 another time and had a field goal blocked.
"So we were down there knocking on the door a few times," Bechtel said. "The key, really, was how we played defensively. The defense was superb tonight; it was outstanding. Our kids just played great."
Farmington held Highland Park to four first downs and its star running back, Michael Dunwoody, who rushed for 1,400 yards last season, to less

than 30, according to Bechtel. "And they're a big-time offensive team," he said. "That's as good a running back as we've ever faced. (Dunwoody) is outstanding and he didn't really hurt us."
The Falcons, who had 166 yards rushing and 10 passing, chose to play it close to the vest, offensively.
"That was the game plan - to go right at them," Bechtel said, "because their speed on the edges is so great. We tried to control the ball and the tempo of the game and, frankly, we did exactly that."
Bechtel added he and the other coaches are proud of the way the Farmington players have worked hard and applied themselves.
"We're proud of how they've adhered to our weekly game plans and how willing they've been to give of themselves for their team," he said.
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Hawk gridders could be NFLHS.com champs, too

While members of the Farmington Harrison football program ponder the possibility of a sixth straight state championship, the Hawks have a chance to be national champions, too.
Harrison is included in the NFLHS.com "Challenge of Champions" - a cyberspace contest to determine the best prep program in the country over the last 30 years.
The Hawks were chosen to represent Michigan and are one of 16 programs in the nation selected to be part of the contest.
Harrison has the best win-

ning percentage in Michigan since 1970 and has won more state titles (12) than any school in state history. The Hawks are 305-60-1 in 33 seasons under coach John Herrington.
Fans will determine who the winner is by casting their votes on the NFLHS.com website.
A panel that included prep scouting experts Tom Lemming and Gil Brandt, as well as NFLHS.com Michigan correspondent John Raffel, chose Harrison to be one of the 16 participants.

Starting the week of Oct. 28, the Hawks will be paired against Cincinnati (Ohio) Moeller in the Central Region. Massillon (Ohio) and Joliet (Ill.) Catholic are the other teams in the region. The Central Region final will be the week of Nov. 25.
The semifinal winners will be determined the weeks of Dec. 2 and 9, and the national championship will be voted on the week of Dec. 16.
The other teams involved the challenge are, by region: East Hampton (Va.), Berwick (Pa.), Brockton (Mass.) and DeMatha (Md.).

South: Belle Glade (Fla.) Glades Central, Odessa (Texas) Permian, Valdosta (Ga.) and Plano (Texas).
West: Long Beach (Calif.) Poly, Honolulu (Hawaii) St. Louis, Concord (Calif.) DeLaSalle and Jenks (Okla.).
On the NFLHS.com site, fans can view descriptions of each program to help them determine which one to vote for.
The team with the most votes during the week its scheduled to play continues to the next round.
The website will announce when fans can start voting on the Harrison-Moeller game.

"They're sound all the way around," Richardson said. "(Woods) is a great player, but they have a lot of kids to go with him."
The two major pre-season objectives with the win. First, they clinched at least a share of the Oakland Activities Association Division I championship.
Harrison finishes 6-1 in the division. Following Lake Orion's 42-13 win Friday over previously unbeaten Rochester Adams, both teams are 5-1 with one game remaining.
Secondly, the Hawks earned their sixth win overall and

qualified for the state playoffs. Harrison (6-2) has been in post-season play more times (21) than any other school.
"The win last week was so huge I think it put the kids over the top as far as confidence and what they can accomplish the rest of the season," Harrison coach John Herrington said.
Harrison and Clarkston traded touchdowns and two-point conversions to start the game Friday.
The Hawks went 72 yards in six plays with the opening kickoff. Pickett caught a 33-yard pass and then a 19-yarder for the TD in which he managed to get a foot down in the back of the end zone.
Ghannam passed to Adam

Griisdale for the two.
"Chase was on fire offensively with his hands," Herrington said. "His first TD catch was amazing. He went up and got it. There was no question; he was the outstanding player of the night."
The Wolves then marched 65 yards in eight plays. Ryan Tibbott ran 9 yards for the TD, and Sam Palace scored the two points on a quarterback keeper.
Harrison came right back with a 66-yard drive, overcoming a pair of penalties along the way, to take a 15-8 lead after 15 plays.
Clarkston (2-4, 4-4) settled for a 35-yard field goal by Andrew Breen on its next possession, but Harrison drove for a third consecutive TD when it got the ball again.
Ghannam fired a line drive, threading the ball between defenders, to Pickett in the end zone for an 11-yard TD toss.
Harrison went 4-for-4 on first-half possessions, scoring again with 1:06 remaining in the half after Pickett turned a pass reception into a 54-yard gain.
The third of five extra-point

kicks by Chris Kollias made the halftime score 29-11.
"I don't know if (taking the field goal) was pivotal, but it was key," Richardson said. "We couldn't do anything to stop them in the first half, and then we turned the ball over too much in the second half."
The Hawks turned a fumble recovery by Brandon Willer and an interception by Charles Stewart into touchdowns after getting the ball at the Clarkston 31 and 11 in the third quarter for a 43-11 lead.
In the fourth, Palace scored on a 1-yard sneak and passed 28 yards to Brandon Anderson for Clarkston TDs.
Ghannam was 10-of-16 passing for 202 yards. Harrison outgained Clarkston on the ground, 230-189, and in total yards, 432-338.
"The passing game was outstanding, and Jake did a great job," Herrington said. "Jake is gaining confidence and poise with each game, and the last two he has been right on."
Tibbott rushed for 103 yards on 19 carries, Palace 58 on 18. Palace completed seven of 21 passes for 149 yards.

**CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS
SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE**
Notice of Adoption of Ordinance C-7-02, an Ordinance to amend Chapter 34, Zoning, of the City Code relating to fences, in order to clarify the intent of the ordinance with respect to setbacks and district requirements.
A full copy of this Ordinance is on file in the Clerk's Office for public review and inspection.
THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:
Section 1.
The Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning, Article XXII, General Provisions, Section 34-551, Fences, is hereby amended as follows:
(a) Residential fences shall be permitted in the RA and RP Districts subject to the requirements applicable to necessary structures and conditions:
(1) A permit shall be required prior to the construction of any fence over three (3) feet in height and over sixteen (16) feet in total length.
(2) Residential fences may be located along a property line if the other provisions of this section are met.
(3) Requirements shall be applicable to fences on zoning lots having a lot area of less than two (2) acres and street frontage of less than two hundred (200) feet, outlined in: a., b., c., and d.
(4) Fences in RA and RP Districts on zoning lots that contain two (2) acres or more shall be subject to the requirements applicable to necessary structures outlined in: a., b., and c.
(b) Fences located in all other districts shall be subject to the following conditions:
(1) A permit shall be required prior to the construction of any fence, regardless of size.
(2) Fences, not to exceed eight (8) feet in height, may be located within any yard except the minimum front yard setback or the minimum setback of a yard abutting a street. Greater setbacks applicable because of formulae based on buildings or parcel size shall not be considered as minimum setbacks.
(3) Fences shall not contain barbed wire or razor wire.
Section 2. Repealer.
Section 3. Severability.
Section 4. Savings.
Section 5. Effective Date: November 4, 2002
Section 6. Enactment: October 14, 2002

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Harrison swimmers win dual meet

Katie Steff and Jakki Waldecker were double individual winners Thursday in Farmington Harrison's 104-81, dual-meet swim victory over host Perndale.
Steff won the 200-yard freestyle (2:06.80) and the butterfly (1:07.20), and Waldecker captured first place in the 100 freestyle (1:00.01) and the breaststroke (1:16.19).
The Hawks, who are 4-4 in dual meets, had another win by Kim Nordhoff in the 500 freestyle (5:50.26).
She and Steff combined with

Beth Leeb and Liz Stieber for first place in the 400 freestyle relay (4:16.42).
Leeb posted a pair of seconds in the 200 freestyle (2:13.25) and the 500 freestyle (5:54.15). Waldecker also anchored the runner-up medley relay and was part of the second-place 200 freestyle relay.
Nordhoff, Jessi Waldecker and Liz Stieber comprised the other three quarters of the medley team that had a 2:07.20 time.
Steff, Stephanie Wegener and Vicki Burezyński also participated in the 200 freestyle relay (1:54.40).
The Hawks had more second-place swims from Stieber in the individual medley (2:35.66), Burezyński in the 50 freestyle (29.74), Megan McNeil in the 100 (1:09.20), Wegener in the 100 freestyle (1:05.52), Nordhoff in the backstroke (1:11.20) and Jessi Waldecker in the breaststroke (1:17.30).
"It was a nice win because we were behind after diving by about three points," Harrison coach Ross Bandy said. "It was a good effort by the kids."
"We're getting ready for the league meet (Nov. 6-8 at Royal Oak Dondero). My kids are tired. We're just happy we won. It wasn't the best we swam, but we swam solid."
"We had a couple more kids (Nordhoff and Leeb) get closer to state cuts. We're looking forward to this year's league meet to see how we can finish."
