New Farmington Downtown Development Director Brent Morgan starts work Monday. The meeting was called with an 18-hour notice in order to both expedite Morgan's starting date, which the DDA wanted next week and to give his present employer

Downey will help to exset the transition when Morgan takes over but, beyond perhaps a 30-duy period, ahe might feel that she's a 'fifth wheel' or a 'lame duck,' Oglesty said. Downey didn't know the leave would be offered at the meeting and was appreciative, Oglesty said. "I will absolutely lake it, Downey said, I was most appreciative."
