The voters don't necessarily set foot inside a polling place, either.

"We're a big absentee (voter) community," Dornan said. "We sent absentee ballots to everyone over 60 — that really gets the seniors to vote."

On election day, 200 election inspectors will be at work at 27 different polling places in the Hills. Additional voting booths have been added to help with the predicted higher turnout, too.

Along with voters statewide, Hills voters will have to choose in each of the following races: governor, secretary of state, attorney general, U.S. Senator, state Board of Education, and governing board members for the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Wayne State University.

Other local races include: ■ The 14th District County Commission race with Republican Michael Rogers and Democrat Ryan Gesund. ■ The 15 District County Commission race with

Republican David Moffitt against Democrat Jim Nash.

■ The 9th District U.S. congressional race, with Republican Joe Knollenberg, Democrat David Fink and Libertarian candidate Robert Schubring.

■ The 14th District State Senate race, with Republican Joe Knollenberg, Democrat David Fink and Libertarian candidate Robert Schubring.

Voters also will have to pick judges for the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, Circuit Court and vote "yes" or "no" on state and county ballot proposals.

All of these ballot choices mean the voting process will take a bit longer for individual voters, Dornan said, adding that voters will need to make sure to fill out both sides of the ballot.

"There will be a lot of reading to do on election day," Dornan said.

A 14-year-old boy trick-or-treating with his father on Halloween was reportedly robbed of his candy and assaulted by three unidentified boys. The incident reportedly occurred in the 33000 block of Walnut at about 8 p.m. when the boy and his father were approached by the three. A pillowcase full of candy was taken and the boy was pushed to the ground. A neighbor reportedly caught up with one of the attackers but was not able to get an ID. The boy was not seriously injured.

Other Halloween incidents reported:

A group of teenage girls reported being harassed by another group of teens while trick-or-treating in the 35000 block of Old Timber at 9:06 p.m. The girls told police that their candy was taken and then given back, and one teen reported being beaten and bruised. No serious injuries were reported.

Someone threw a pumpkin through the windshield of a vehicle parked in the 31000 block of Orchard Lake at 9:38 a.m. Thursday, causing \$500 damage.

Another wayward pumpkin incident was reported 10:52 a.m. Thursday in the 29000 block of Birchcrest, this time involving a gourd being thrown through a house window, causing \$100 damage.

A 25-year-old Dryden woman was arrested for operating under the influence of liquor after being pulled over on I-696 near Middlebelt 3:13 a.m. Friday. Her alcohol level checked in at .17. She told police that she had been drinking at a Halloween party.

Vandalism

A 1996 Chevrolet Cavalier parked in the 27000 block of Independence, in the Botsford Village complex, sustained an undisclosed amount of damage Tuesday. Damage included a smashed driver's side window, four punctured tires and exterior paint scraped down around the vehicle's perimeter.

A resident living in the 23000 block of Barfield on Oct. 29 reported graffiti painted on the garage door, consisting of a spray-painted middle finger.

Disorderly conduct

A 47-year-old Ferndale man was arrested for disorderly conduct after police found him wandering into traffic Wednesday near the 29000 block of Eight Mile. His bodily alcohol content registered .27.

Indecent exposure

A female patron at Roosevelt, 27843 Orchard Lake, reported an indecent exposure incident at 3:07 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 30. The woman told police that she was standing outside when a man drove by, rolled down his window and spoke to her. She reportedly ignored him, and he attempted the same with another female,

before coming back to the first woman, who then reported seeing him masturbate in his vehicle. She provided a license plate number to police, who are investigating the incident.

Another indecent exposure incident was reported Wednesday in the 27000 block of Gateway. A woman outside on a balcony reported seeing a man outside walking his dog, and said that he looked around, looked at her and quickly revealed his genitals. The man was questioned by police and said that he had only tucked his shirt into his pants and did not expose himself.

Dog attack

A jogger reported being attacked by a loose dog while in the area of Lochmoor and Trolleyton Wednesday, Oct. 30. The

jogger, a 35-year-old Farmington Hills woman, told police that a large black dog knocked her to the ground while she was jogging and began biting her. A witness, who was driving by, and the woman broke free and got into the vehicle. The jogger sustained only minor injuries from the attack, and the skin was not punctured. The dog's owner, a 49-year-old Farmington Hills woman, was ticketed for failing to maintain control of her dog.

Drug arrest

A 43-year-old Westland woman was pulled over for equipment violations on her 1996 Oldsmobile and arrested for possession of crack cocaine Wednesday. A police report stated that she was heading west on Grand River from Eight Mile when she pulled over and

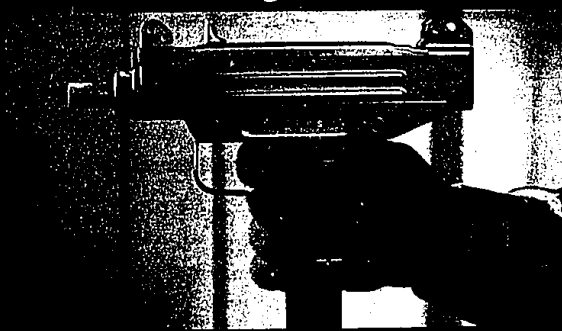
subsequently searched. During the traffic stop, she reportedly punched at a police officer, who subdued her with pepper spray. Two rock-like substances, later identified as crack cocaine, were discovered on her person.

Domestic violence

A 48-year-old Farmington Hills woman was arrested for domestic violence following an argument with her husband about beer. He reportedly became angry with her when she gave a micro-brewed beer to a friend, who only drank half of it. The woman said he became verbally abusive and she retaliated by striking him in the face with an open hand.

Opposed Closing the Gun Show Loophole

Knollenberg voted for an NRA proposal that would have weakened existing law by reducing the amount of time for law enforcement to conduct background checks on gun sales, making it easier for criminals to buy guns.
