Pettibone house holds Little Me romantic memories

nee the Farmington Pioneer settlers had a successful farm, they improved their houses to reflect their new status. One of the homes is the Pettibone house, an elegant Victorian structure on 12 Mile Road in Farmington Hills. Home to various members of Farmington pioneer families, it is also the site of two romantic sto-

romantic sto-rics.
One was told

by the late Robert Cook, a Farmington genealogist. The other was related by the late Alice Jones Bigelow, granddaughter of the

Bigelow, granddaughter of the Pettibones. Before the Civil Wat two good friends, John Pettibone and Charles Button, who lived on neighboring farms along 12 Wile Road, fell in love with the same girl, Kate Simmons. She had lived in Franklin with her family since 1841, when she was sky years old.

The Simmons family traveled from Chatam, New York on the Zric Canal. Kate's father was a farmer who also taught school in the winter where Kate attended.

attended. Faced with the attentions of attended.
Faced with the attentions of two suitors, Kate chose John Pettibone. They married on New Years Day 1853. Charles didn't marry for a long time after. Kate and John made their home in the Pettibone house in 1867 where they raised four children, three boys and a girl. They added the front Victorian section of the building around 1880.
In tracing the Pettibone house's history, an 1872 farm map shows two houses on the farm. One belonged to Levi and Huldah Pettibone and the other to their eldest son, Judson and his wife Emeline. John was the youngest of the Pettibone sons.
Judson built the first part of the Pettibone louse in 1861; John and Kate built the front or Victorian parts.

Victorian part. In 1889, they sold the Pettibone house and farm, where John had raised grain and fruit, and did some dairy farming. The couple moved to the Botsford House on Botsford Hill, where they continued to

Inil, where they commone to farm. 108, they retired to Gramington Village and lived on Grand River, selling home-grown produce for a number of years. Kate Simmons Fettibone lived to be the oldest woman Farmington. She continued to live in her house on Grand River visited by her children, grandchildren and great-grandchild, as well as many friends from the community.

When she died in 1931 at the age of 93, her life was noted in the local and Detroit newspapers.

ANOTHER LOVE STORY

The other romance attached The other romance attached to the Pettibone house that we know about involved Isabelle Pettibone and Hamilton Jones. She was one of Judson and Emcline's four children. When Belle married Hamilton in 1866, he built a house for her across the road from her parent's farm. They had two children. When Belle died at the age of 30 in 1881, Hamilton gave up farming. He moved to Novi and was in the general store and hotel business. Hamilton eventually remar-

Hamilton eventually remar-ried. He turned his farm over to young Judson Jones who was Alice Jones Bigelow's father. The next owners of the

Pettibone farm were the

Schroeder family.
Fred and his wife Rachael purchased the farm in 1888. Fr cd and his wire tachatel purchased the farm in 1888. The next owners were August and Lavy Schroeder. The Schroeders were potato farmers. In 1942 the Pettibone-Schroeder farmlands became the Schroeder farmlands became the Schroeder farmlands became the Schroeder farm Subdivision. The farmhouse was a residence.
