# Blazers take controversial victory over Blue Jays

Time stood still for the final 2.9 seconds as far as the Southfield High girls basketball team was concerned Friday night.
But when it was time to hoist the Class A district bas-

But when it was time to hoist the Class A district bas-ketball trophy, Livonia Ladywood was doing the celebrating following a confusing and controversial finish as the host Blazers came away with a 42-41 victory thanks to Anny Jacovetti's rebound basket as the horn sounded.

The injured-riddled Blazers, who captured their seventh district crown in eight years, live to play another day. Top-ranked and unbeath Detroit King, the Public School League champion, awaits the 18-5 Blazers in the regional semifinal 7:30 p.m. Monday at Ladywood.

Game officials T.J. Lieckfelt and Bill Baurgart would not

With 6.7 seconds left in regulation, Southfield guard Jazmin Williamson hit her first free throw to give the Jays a 41-40 lend. The senior missed the second foul shot attempt and a mad scramble ensued resulting in a jump ball.

Ladywood the ball out-ofbounds, 10 feet short of the
mid-court line, with only 2.9

The ball never hit the rim, but caromed perfectly to Jacovetti, who was in the right place at the right time, putting the rebound home before the buzzer sounded.

Ironically, it was Jacovett's only two points of the game.
"We had no timeouts left, we wanted Lauren to catch it and shoot it, or drive it to the baseket." Ladywood coach Andrea Gorski said." Give Amy credit, she didn't hang around behind the three-point line, she got down on the weakside board. It was good for her to follow the shot."

The Blazers jumped out to an 11-1 in the first quarter, but lost junior point-guard Amber willoughby to a hyperextend-ed knee with 3:14-left in the first quarter, (Another Ladywood starter, Ruth Svenickas, phyed despite a swollen knee.) Southfield, hitting only 1-of-11 first-period shots, trailed 11-3 but quickly took advantage of Willoughby's absence by going to a full-court press in the second quarter. Evans, the senior guard who led Southfield with 5 points, sparked a second-quarter comeback as the Jays

outscored Ladywood, 17-7. Evans' three-pointer at the halfilme buzzer gave the Jays a 20-18 advantage. Southfield then opened up a

Southfield then opened up a 27-19 third-quarter advantage but Ladywood clawed back to within two, 30-28, despite Kineta Taylor's short bank shot inside the key as time

The Blue Jays seemed to take command of the tighty-contested struggle with 1:05 left on a hoop by Jaria Aktins followed by a free throw by Evans with 44.4 remaining to put Southfield alread 38-34.

But 6-foot-2 junior center Bethany, Jury secord on a rebound, was fouled and converted the free throw to close the gap to 38-37 with 32.4 to \$60.

The teams then traded turnovers before Williamson, who made several clutch plays down the stretch, nailed a pair of free throws with 30.4

That setting the stage for the controversial final 2.9 seconds. Gorski, who spoke with Lieckfelt and Baumgart afterwards, was given an explanation on why the clock wasn't restarted following Day's first inbound pass.
