Doll project exceeds \$250,000 mark

In its sixth year, the Hadasash Doll Project has provided 28,000 dolls to more than a dozen area hospitals. The dolls are used for emotional support for kids in the hospital and as an edu-cational tool, said Eleanor Smith of West Bloomfield, a project coordinator. They try to use the dolls for teach-ing and for comforting, "said Smith. "Even for X-rays, (the children) are hysterical, and it kind of calms them down." Aside from being a comfort, the dolls

cess without the volunteers, who meet weekly or monthly to cut the patterns, sew the pieces together, stuff them and make the little hospital gowns for "It's a wonderful project," said Smith.
