CC wins D1 shootout with Falcons

The Pontiac Silverdome is still a comfortable home for the Redford-Detroit Catholic Central football team.
CC played its best offensive game of the season in capturing the 2002 Division I state title Saturday with a 36-28 win over

game of the season in capturing the 2002 Division I state title Saturday with a 36-26 win over East Kentwood.

The championship is the second straight and fifth in eight years for the Shamrocks, dating back to 1995 for one of the most dominating runs in state history among Class Aor Division I teams.

Thicking on one of the most explosive teams in the state, CO was able to rely on its tough defense, despite giving up nearly twice as many points as it had in any game all season.

This was one of the greatest games I've ever been involved with, "said CC coach Tom Macb, who won his seventh state championship as head conch.

Conversely, the Shamrock defense hadn't given up more than 14 points in one game. Although the Falcons (13-1) got off to a flying start in the first quarter, the Shamrocks tackled more effectively as the game wore on.

CC scored perhaps its most important touchdown of the day on the very next drive, a methodical 70-yard push that culminated with a Brooks score from 16 yards out.

McMichael for a two-point conversion pass, tying the score at 8-8. Aleman, who finished with 2,836 rushing yards this season, answered with a 70-yard
TD sprint on Kentwoods second drive. The CC defense made a key stop on the two-point attempt, putting the Falcons up just six, 14-8.

The shamrocks used almost the entire second quarter on one drive, taking up more than six minutes before Thomas tossed an option to Brooks for a

4-yard TD in the final minute of the first half. Jason Gingell's extra point gave CC the half-time lead, 15-14.

Aleman had a highlight-film run in the third quarter, drag-ging four defenders into the

run in the third quarter, aragging four defenders into the end zone on a tough 28-yard TD run. But the CC defense stuffed the two-point conversion attempt again, so the Falcons were still down, 22-20. A 41-yard seramble by Thomas set up the lone CC touchdown not scored by Brooks. Senior Randell Means cut through the heart of the East Kentwood defense for a lo-yard sore in the wanning moments of the third quarter, giving CC a 29-20 lead.

Quarterback Cory Sanders was chased 15 yards back from the line of serimmage and threw a desperation pass that was caught by Tom Slager in the back of the end zone. The Shannrocks foiled a third two-point attempt by the Falcons. CC put the nail in East Kentwood's coffin with a decisive 66-yard drive that took just seven plays. Brooks ran off right tackle once again for a 6-yard score with 4:34 left, making it a 10-point game.
