

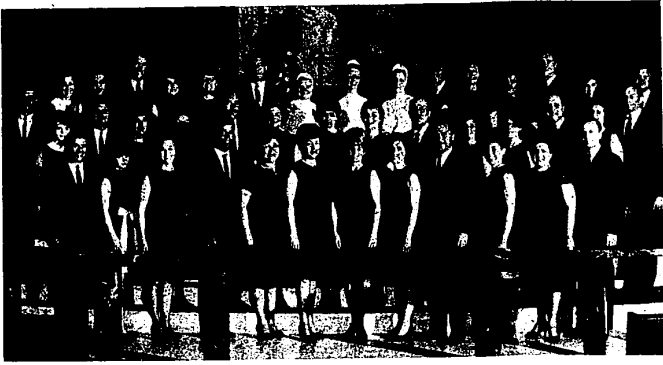
Thanksgiving Service Set In Plymouth

The Plymouth Community Council of Churches will sponsor a Union Thanksgiving Eve service in St. John's Episcopal Church, 574 Sheldon Road, at 7 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 27. The sermon will be delivered by the Rev. Paul M. Cargio of First Methodist Church and the choir of the First Baptist Church will provide special music.

The free will offering will be used to aid the children of Biafra.

The council represents Methodist, Baptist, Catholic, Lutheran, Presbyterian and Episcopal churches, and members of all congregations in Plymouth are urged to attend.

Bob Johnston, vice president of the council, called the service "a united display of thanks for all the benefits we have received this year."

11 Churches Join In Service

Eleven Farmington churches will join in a Thanksgiving Eve service at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 27. The First United Methodist Church, 33112 Grand River, will host the community service, and two choirs from Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church will furnish music.

Preaching the Thanksgiving sermon will be the Rev. Albert C. Kolch, of St. Alexander's Catholic parish. Following the service will be a reception in the Methodist church hall, to be furnished and served by the women's groups of the 11 participating churches.

OTHER CHURCHES joining in the community Thanksgiving service will be St. Gerald and St. Clair Catholic churches, First United Presbyterian, Salem United Church of Christ, Nazarin Park, Orchard United Methodist, North Farmington Baptist and Antioch Lutheran. Don Zielski directs the

adult choir and vested boys' choir from Our Lady of Sorrows. The groups will have accompaniment on organ and brass instruments and there also will be musical participation by the congregation.

FOR THE SECOND YEAR, the Farmington community service offering will be used to support the emergency fund of the local office of Economic Opportunity.

The fund is not supported by any local or federal agency, and is used exclusively to meet immediate and pressing needs of individuals and families until contact with established welfare agencies can be made.

The offering taken at Farmington's Thanksgiving Eve service last year provided through June a working fund that was used for emergency prescriptions, overnight lodging, shoes, transportation and fuel for heating and cooking.

"As a symbol and a statement of concern regarding every human need, we will again dedicate our offering of praise to this fund," said the Rev. Bryce Swiler, associate minister of First Methodist and one of the planners of the 1968 service.

The art show will feature miniature and full-size acrylics by Jack LeMoine, and oil and modern wood sculpture by Joe Lack.

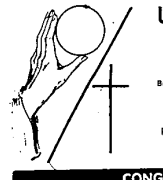
Santa Claus will be there for the kids and colored pictures will be taken.
