Farmington City Clerk Patsy Cantrell gets a little worked up when she talks about state rev-

enue sharing. News that Gov. John

cuts were enacted by the state legislature Friday wasn't as bad as it could have been, she said. But it's still far from good

news.
"We started with a threat

pletely eliminate state revenues sharing, she said. We heard about cuts ranging from 20 to 30 percent or more. The 3.5 percent reduction is drawing fire from local offi-cials in both Farmington and Farmington Hills, primarily

because of the 11th hour tim-ing. Officials say they're get-ting tired of having to adjust their budgets mid-year in order to help balance the state's books.

Friday was a little soon to calculate the actual financial

impact, because Cantrell doesn't know yet the base figure used for the reduction. State revenue sharing accounts for about 19 percent of city rev-

enues. While budgeting is compli-

City authorizes 'flashy' speed trailer

Motorists should be on the lookout

Motorists should be on the lookout for a new and improved speed trailer in Farmington in the coming months. City officials approved funding for the trailer Monday. The current model sim-ply displays a vehicle's speed as it approaches. Public Safety Director Gary Goss says ther'll be no ignoring the new warning for those who are violating posted speed

limits.
"It's going to flash red lights at you as you're going by, he explained. "There won't be any mistake."
Goss said the old trailer is in 'kind of bad shape,' but the department will fix it up and use it in other parts of the city. It couldn't be stationed on Grand River, because its radar unit would detect traffice coming from both directions.
The new trailer will measure speeds only from on-coming traffic, Goss said.
