Cable agreement will bring basic rate down

Officials can't keep the cost of premium cable television from going up every year, but members of the Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission aren't ones to lay down and not fight for cable viewers' rights.

An ancoming change that will have

An upcoming change that will have line-Warner Cable run by its partner company, Advance/Rowhouse, brought about a need to settle business between Time Warner and SWOCC. The cable operation serves Farmington, Farmington Hills, Livonia and Novi.

Jerry Ellis, Farmington Hills city councilman and SWOCC board member, said a resolution agreement brought forward

Monday settles outstanding disputes between the commission and the cable operation.

Part of the deal will lower basic cable

Part of the deal will lower basic cable service from \$12 to \$51 a month for the years 2003 and 2004, however few customers have only basic service (Channels 1-22). Time-Warner has opiced to raise expanded cable rates, over which SWOCC has no control.

Ellis said an audit showed the cable provider owed \$94,000 to the commission, but Time-Warner contended the cost was \$15,000. Ellis said the two agreed to settle the account for \$45,000. Another benefit for viewers is Advance/Newhouse will be bringing Michigan Government TV to the Farmington local cable channel soon,

Ellis said.
The Farmington Hills City Council approved the transfer agreement between Time-Warner and Advance/Newhouse
