Bags may be purchased at local hardware stores, as well as Farmington Hills DPW or City Hall, for S3 for a ten pack of bags.

It has been many years since weather has forced the city to end its leaf program before it could complete its schedule. Officials expressed the hope that more normal conditions next year will allow the pro-gram to be operated at the level both the city and residents expect.
