A Mitten tree holds warm mittens, hats, and scarves for needy children in Detroit, given later in the month.

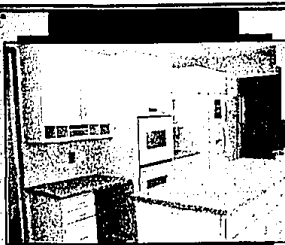
A toy box filled with new toys went to Christ Church Toy Shop in Detroit.

knew she had to have one. It was made by Ideal and very popular because it came with a play wave kit to style and "perm" its hair.

"This doll was expensive and hard to find, so I had to give specific hints and clues to my Aunt Lil as to my desire for this doll since she always gave me a special gift on Christmas Eve," said Holcomb, who lives in Farmington Hills.

Aunt Lil came through, and on Christmas Eve presented her niece with a box containing the Toni doll. That same night Diane's family went out to dinner, leaving home Duchess, an uncle's boxer they were dog-sitting. When they returned home, Duchess greeted them with a mouthful of yellow hair.

"We knew at once that my new Toni doll was the victim," Holcomb said.

Forty years later, Diane saw an ad in a doll magazine for a 1959 Toni doll from an owner in Washington for \$200. She sent off a check and two weeks later her doll arrived.

"This time she is in a glass case," Diane said. "She will always remind me of my generous Aunt Lil."

Noreen Kennedy remembers the sound of sleigh bells and Santa's "Ho! Ho! Ho!" on the Christmas Eves of her childhood in Dearborn Heights. On Christmas Eve in 1957, Santa entered her bedroom and placed a Tiny Tears doll in her arms.

"I was a very proud 6-year-old momma," said Noreen, whose sister, Colleen Giovanni of Farmington Hills, prompted her to tell her Christmas doll story. "The feeling and memory of holding Tiny Tears securely in my arms while walking into our living room remains so vivid in my mind. ... There stood a beautifully decorated Christmas tree with tinsel, colored lights and candy canes. I still remember the expression on the faces of my mom and dad as we looked in awe and felt the magic of the evening."

Alas, poor Tiny Tears was soon to suffer an indignity. Noreen's 2-year-old brother, John, "nibbled" on her fingers and toes. Actually, he more than nibbled, Colleen said. "He bit the toes off."

Forty-five years later, Tiny Tears and Noreen still spend

"It was most appropriate for me to get a Chatty Cathy doll because it wasn't until after my third birthday did I start talking. My older brother, John, did all the talking for me. He knew exactly what I need every time I pointed at something or grunted some sounds," said Catherine.

"But all of a sudden I started talking and never stopped. ... To this day my family still calls me Chatty Cathy because I just talk, talk, talk, talk."

Catherine doesn't know what became of her Chatty Cathy, but she's looking for another one for her 3½-year-old daughter, Amy, who, like her mother, never stops talking.

They're something to love, cuddle and play with ... until you both grow old together. Merry Christmas.



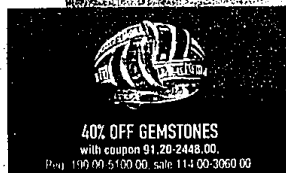
