2002 highlights include elections, crime, tragedy and triumph

Farmington Hills city council members approved plans for a nine-hole golf course expansion at San Marino, despite opposition from residents who didn't want trees felled or additional housing built near their homes. The project includes 80 condominium units.

Farmington Community
Library joined others in the
area to launch the "Pay It
Forward" reading program,
which included on-line discussion groups and a drive to get

community members to "pay it forward" as 12-year-old Trevor McKinnon did in the book by author Catherine Ryan Hyde. Brian Gallison, 27, was named the 2002 Farmington Hills Firefighter of the year. Just weeks after his father passed away, State Rep. Andrew Raczkowski announced he would face off against incumbent U.S. Senator Carl Levin in the November General Election. Farmington Hills dentist Donald R. Quinn forfeited \$5,000 in bail after falling to appear in court for a preliminary hearing on a stalking charge. Quinn was accussed of drugging a patient and holding her against her will in his apartment.

More than 70 people who

have promoted and supported the cause of diversity in Farmington and Farmington Hills were honored by the Multicultural Multiracial Community Council at the 2002 Rainbow Awards Breakfast.

FEBRUARY

Former Farmington Hills Mayor Aldo Vagnozzi announced his bid for the State House seat that would be vacat-ed by term-limited State Rep. Andrew Raczkowski. Hills Police boosted patrols in neighborhoods after reports of a man accessing vague grifa.

in neighborhoods after reports of a man accosting young girls. Dentist Ibonald Quinn resurfaced after missing a court appearance in January; police said he'd been on a 20-day trip to Barbados, He was arrested by U.S. Customs officers after exiting an airplane in Philadelphia. Farmington School officials were pleasantly surprised when Gov. John Engler proposed a \$200 increase in the state's per pupil foundation grant to schools.

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Hills city council members put to rest four years of intense scrutiny and public controversy when they founly signed a contract for development of the 11 Pines property at 11 Mile and Halsted Roads. The project includes an expansion of San Marino golf course, housing and the capping of an abandoned landfill.

Farmington city officials created a unique commission whose members are charged with citywide beautification as well as environmental issues.

Plans to rebuild Cowley's Old Village Inn were approved by the Farmington City Council, allowing owners to raze the 30-year-old building on Grand River and construct a two-story publyrestaurant. Completing is expected in February, 2003. A car accident in Kentucky claimed the lives of four family members on their way home from a Florida vacation.

Richard and Judy McKennett and their children Mike and Megan died in the crash on 1-75; the McKennets' 17-year-old daughter Lindsey survived.

An Bi-year-old West Bloomfield woman died when she wandered onto a residential street in north Farmington, and was struck and killed by an SUV driven by an 18-year-old Farmington Hills man. The death was ruled an accident. The first annual Turn Around Achievement Award winners
