The Farmington Community Library on 12 Mile in Parmington Hills is postponing its dedication ceremony and public eclebration until Jan. 26. The event planned Jan. 12 has been postponed because renovation has taken longer than anticipated. The city haan't yet Issued a certificate of occupancy. The library closed on Dec. 31 and will remain closed until the permit is issued, said Library Director Bev Papal. She hopes that will take place during the week of Jan. 13. The decision was made to postpone the event

after meeting with her construc-tion team Thursday morning and talking with several library board members, Papal said. The director said getting the library finished properly is the primary concern. The Jan. 26 dedication is expected to be held from 2-6 p.m.

"We anticipate local digni-taries and we've extended an invitation to the governor," Papal said, adding music and refresh-ments will be offered.
