Maples frustrate Falcons' efforts in OAA match

Birmingham Seaholm outplayed host Farmington on the volleyball court Thursday and handed the Falcons a 15-11, 15-3 defeat.

The loss left Farmington with a 1-2 record in the Oakland Activities Association Division I and a 10-7-1 overall tally.

"We started off well and it went down hill from there," Falcons coach Alex Perrin said. "There's no nice way of saying it. We just had our hats handed to us. Seaholm outplayed us, particularly on defense."

The Maples were in control in both games, although nine straight service points by Farmington's Jessica Janowicz made the first appear closer than it was, according to Perrin.

"We had a difficult time setting (up for the attack)," he said. "I'm not sure if they just caught us well against us, or they scouted us well and knew our tendencies."

"They played very good defense against us. The things we do well they defended, and we didn't make the adjustments needed to combat those things."

Janowicz had four kills, four digs and four aces. Jill Alspach had three kills and nine digs. Alison Kahnuff added five digs.

A long, intense, back-and-forth volley early in the match resulted in a sideout in favor of Seaholm, and that had a

deflating effect on the Falcons, Perrin said.

"We had eight, nine good swings at the ball, and they kept sticking an arm out and sending it back," he said.

"They were dead-on swings that usually score points for us. We had a hard time scoring points, and I think that got in their heads. It rattled us; it got to us."

Dragons defeat Raiders

Lake Orion defeated visiting North Farmington in an OAA Division II match Thursday, 15-8, 15-10.

Any Berke served six points, had four kills and made 10 digs to lead the Raiders, who are 0-3 in the division.

Brittany Pawjowski also served six points; she had

eight digs and two kills. Bridgette Bears recorded three service points and Catherine Munaco six digs.

The Raiders had their ups and downs emotionally during the match, allowing a setback to affect their play, according to coach Gus Dumlio.

"We've improved a lot from where we started, but right now if there's a string of lost points it affects part of the game," he said. "They recognize that; hopefully, we can turn that around."

"I stress having desire and to play with heart. I see signs of that, so that's a good thing. They might have gotten down during certain parts of the game, but they're starting to believe in their skills and what they can do."

Five-8 Jessica Coudin, who had four kills against Clawson, and 5-7 Casey Fetters are outside hitters, and 5-7 Alaina Maddox, another returning varsity player, is a backup setter who can play in

the front court, too. A pair of juniors, 5-8 Katie Ross and 5-6 Taylor Wong, moved up from the JV this year. They're middle and outside hitters, respectively.

"We've got a lot of girls back from last year's squad and a fresh group of younger girls who really want to play," Lashbrook said. "We have a nice mix of experience and leadership with younger talent."

"Our goal is to not drop the ball, to keep it rolling. That's where the brightest stars in the sophomore and junior classes

will, hopefully, move into the same thing for next season."

The Hawks, who reached the semi-finals of the Farmington-Harrison tournament and the gold bracket playoffs in tournaments at West Bloomfield and Walled Lake Central, are 10-6 overall. Previously, Harrison has beaten Auburn Hills Avondale and Royal Oak Dendero in OAA Division III matches and will try for its fourth straight win Monday night at Bloomfield Hills Andover.

Tiffany Burt scored 20 points, Dana Millard 14, Meaghen Thornberry 13, Leah Antilla and Ashlee Larsen 11 apiece.

Thornberry also had a game-high 15 rebounds, nine assists and five steals. Larsen had six assists and four steals. Burt had four and six, respectively.

Guard Ashley Wagner scored a game-high 22 points for the Monarchs, who are 1-2 and 6-8. Jackie Kondziolka added 12 points and Barbara Dudek had 13 rebounds as Macomb outbounded OCC, 52-45.
