Parents and officials who are paying close attention to stolescent sleep time research will have another opportunity to learn more at an upcortuing forum. The Walled Lake Consolidated Schools Sleep Needs for Learning Committee will host a panel of experts to discuss the issue at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 29, at the Clifford Smart Middle School, 8500 Commerce Road in Commerce. The public is invited. Officials and parents from Farmington Public Schools participated in meetings on later start times last year, with the goal of giving secondary students extra sleep time in the morning. The program, 'How Important Is Sleep for Your Child?' will feature Huron Valley Hospital physicians Mare Bocknek, a Farmington Hills resident, speaking on 'Sleep Needs for Today,' and SucAnne Hill, 'The Over-Scheduled Child.'
Glenn Whitelaw, social worker for Walled Lake Schools, will also speak on "The Effects Sleep Has on Learning.' The Sleep Needs for Today,' and SucAnne Hill, 'The Over-Scheduled Child.'
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The Sleep Needs for Committee was formed last year to educate the community with a core set of facts about connections between human sleep needs and learning and to explore possible action plans to support

healthy, more productive learning experiences, said Judy Evola, director of Walled Lake community relations and marketing.
