Family: Teen's sentence 'a joke'

A 17-year-old Farmington Hills boy, who pleaded guilty to two counts of vehicular manslaughter of two Farmington Hills residents last year, was sentenced to probation by an Oakland County Circuit Courr judge.

Family members still grieving their loss are calling the sentence "njoke". Killed in the April accident wero Barburn Gorreck, 68, and her hus-band, Gerald Gorzeck, 76. They were returning to their condominum from Detroit, where they were volunteer ushers at the Fox Theatro. Police estimated the speed of the

Camaro in excess of 80 mph at the time of impact. The boy was 16 at the time of the accident and a student at North Farmington High School. Police say he was drag razing his Chevrolet Camaro against another Camaro driver south of 14 Mile on Orchard Lake when he crashed into an elderly couple's ear, who were turning

left into their condominium entrance.
The driver of the other Camaro, an 18-year-old West Bloomfield man, is awaiting a Jury trial on two counts of vehicular manslaughter in Oakland County Circuit Court. His car was not involved

in the impact.
