CC skiers place 3rd in league

Redford-Detroit Catholic Central placed third in the Feb. 6 Mount Brighton Interscholastic Ski Association divisional championships and was third in the overall league standings.

Based on the 10-meet season, the Shamrocks actually tied the University of Detroit-Jesuit for second with 32 points, but they lost a tiebreaker based on the divisional results.

Brighton won the division title with 74 points; U-D had 113 and CC 129. Brighton, which had seven firsts and three

seconds, also was the overall champion with 13 points.

"Obviously, the boys are a little disappointed," CC coach Tom Gable said. "They came with the intention of hanging on to second place, but we needed a decent performance across the board."

"(Senior) Pat Repasky (CC's top skier) didn't have one of his better days. He did on one run in each meet, but he didn't put two together. It's never just one guy, however."

In the giant slalom Thursday morning, the Shamrocks were third with 69 points behind Brighton (23) and South Lyon (68).

CC's Che Martinez was seventh (24.99), Craig Camden 17th (26.43), Nick Barilovich 20th (27.13), Eric Cielifian 25th (27.82), Repasky 31st (28.56) and Eric Kasprovicz 32nd (28.76). All are seniors.

"Pat was really attempting to go all out and prove something," Gable said. "In the morning, he put together a great first run and was right there with the pack in the top five. He just had a little trouble in the second run and didn't ski as well."

The afternoon slalom meet was a virtual repeat with Repasky suffering the same misfortune, Gable added.

"When you lose a guy like that, the numbers add up a lot faster," he said.

Martinez also was seventh (32.19) in the slalom; Kasprovicz 13th (33.91), Camden 19th (35.81), Repasky 21st (35.25), Brandon Gaskins 30th (37.32) and Barilovich 45th (41.97).

"Che was skiing where I thought he should be," Gable said. "I would have liked to see him break in the top five, but he was real consistent. The rest of the guys are always trying to get in the top 15 and were just about there."

"They're going to have to turn it up a bit for the regional. I know they're disappointed, but I don't think they're done."

"They have a lot of confidence. They don't feel things are slipping away. They have to sell up to their potential; if they do, they have a shot." South Lyon's John Thompson was the divisional winner in the giant slalom (23.81) and the slalom (29.80).
