The best way for eighth grade students to address issues is talk to other students, he said.

The plan would have four or five high school seniors talking to all the eighth-graders at middle schools. The district could provide a fact versus myth sheet of information and offer tutoring or mentoring for students who are struggling academically. Yaldo said 26 middle school students could be brought to North Earmington and paired with a high school student to spend the day, cat lunch and talk.
