Calls pour in after Tyndale staff plea

The staff at William Tyndale College in Farmington Hills is getting hundreds of phone calls after putting out a call for funds that might keep the Christian-based school from closing after graduation this May.

As of Friday morning, about \$18,000 has been raised in reaction to 11 staff members' quest to raise \$1 million. Their goal is to show the cellege's board of directors the school should remain autonomous.

The board voted March 5 to close the 58-year-old college unless a merger with a similar college or a buyout could be reached before then, said Karen Mulligan, college

spakeswoman.
Eleven staff members are hoping the money will show the board there is support to keep the school.
