place in offices around the
state, Of those, 3 million were
performed over the Internet,
Chesney said.

Also, progress is being made
toward officing credit card
payments at branch offices.

As another cost-saving measure, any branch office signs
that say the previous secretary's
name will be taken down permanently, so the department
doesn't have to put up new
segre every time a new
Secretary of State is elected.

Also popular is a proposal to
offer vanily plate searches on
the Internet, so people interested in custom plates can
check whether the letter or

number combination they want is available.

The display can even show what the plate would look like. Gov. Jennifer Granbolm has pruposed increasing license renewal fees from \$13 to \$25 and boosting chauffeur and truck driver license fees as well. The Secretary of State's office won't see most of that proposed increase in revenue, Land said; actually, the office anticipates a possible 15-percent budget reduction under the governor's proposal.
