

## NFHS teens share war concerns

Students interested in foreign affairs at North Farmington High School have been meeting Thursdays after classes to discuss U.S. relations with Iraq. As war against the Middle East country began late Wechesday, about 20 students stopped in the meeting led by Elias Khalil, who teaches international Issues.

As MSNBC channel broadcasted the

latest reports on a television set with the volume turned off, teachers Jim Denko and Chuck Stenius also joined in the diagnostor in the discussion

Many students still wanted to know what led to the war and what would happen once Operation Freedom Iraq

as over. Some students felt the attack wasn't

yet warranted.
Denko talked about Iraq violating
the United Nations order to disarm its
weapons of mass destruction and said

President Bush doesn't want the weapons used later against the U.S. or sold to 'rogue' nations. However, he did point out the U.S. gave military aid to fraqi President Saddam Husselin in the 1980s, when the U.S. opposed neighboring fran's leadership. "We chose the lesser of the two evils,"

e said. Khalil told the students an uncle who used to live in Iraq but now lives in Canada told him the other day the people "feel Hussein is a terrible per-son."

Sind on Brandon Leopold, 17, said with the war underway, she had a gut feeling that something had would happen in the U.S. in the form of retaintion.
