All zone maps don't look the same because they have been revised several times over the years. Newer maps have been subdivided into a' and t'b sections from Zoness to 10, with a portion of the 'a' Zones being an average of 5 degrees cooler than the 'b' portion. Also, Zone 11 has been added for very warm climates.

A chart showing the range of average annual minimum temperatures for each zone will guide.

white, you will notice a different "testure" for each region
that corresponds to the zones.
Look at our Zone 5, with average annual minimum temperatures from minus-20 degrees.

If the map is in color, it will be very easy to distinguish the different zones.

Some planst, depending on where they are placed in the landscape, such as a sheltered area, can survive in a colder temperature than the zone indicates. On the other hand, or plant is on a hilltop in a Zone 4 area, it may not survive because that hilltop temperature probably has a Zone 3 situation.

Plants don't know where the lines are, and neither do we, but the zone maps are good

but the zone maps are good guides.
That's what makes gardening such a challenge. Our gardens have microclimates and alk kinds of weather that affect the plants, so we can't just rely on the zone cliant alone.
It's fun to experiment and see what happens. Now we have the new Heat Zone map to learn about.
