Royal Oak Dendro scored two goals in the final 1 1/2 minutes of the first half Thursday and held on to defeat host Farmington in girls soccer, 2-1.

Kelly Lutz scored the first goal for the Oaks, and Carol Roman gave them a 2-0 half-time lead when she scored with 1:40 remaining in the first half.

"For the next 25 minutes of the first half, we were playing very well," Farmington coach Steve Montgomery said. "We hit a couple posts and had a ball die on the goal line. I thought we were outplaying them a bit."

"In the last 10 minutes, they really stepped up their play and started taking control. They moved the ball and penetrated our defense a couple times."

"We had a good halftime talk and set some new goals for the second half. We wanted to shut them down, get two goals back and tie it up. We only got one back, but we played very well."

Joyce Rose scored the Farmington goal with 19:52 to play in the game with an assist by Lindsay Evans.

The Falcons are 1-1 in the Oakland Activities Association Division II and overall. The Oaks are 1-0 and 2-1.

"It was a very good game - the kind of game, when you're done, you're proud of both teams, because they played very hard," Montgomery said. "When we were done, they respected us and we respected

them. "Blowouts are good for stats, but they're not fun. This was a really competitive, fun game."

"We were off the field a couple minutes, and the girls were saying, 'We get to play them again.' They're looking forward to it, because it was a good game."

Kate Kelly made six saves in goal for the Falcons, who had eight quality shots.

Montgomery cited the play of Evans, Mary Peszek, Erica Rose, Joyce Rose, Kristin Pietila, Katy Johnson and defenders Kelly Hay, Maggie Vaillancourt, Malory McGee and Erin Deroo.

HEBERDON NODES

Certainly a reason for concern is a thickening and enlargement in your knuckles. The good news is that while these changes may initially cause soreness in your hands, that problem soon disappears. Furthermore, these changes in your hands do not limit the function of your fingers, you need not be concerned you will become crippled.

The bad news is that these changes are inherited, there is nothing you can do, or medicine you can take, to prevent these changes. In addition, enlargement of your knuckles occurs because of the laying down of calcium, that is, extra bone around the finger joint. That means that a hand surgeon cannot perform cosmetic surgery to restore your fingers to their former contours. These changes in your knuckles are called Heberdon nodes when they occur at the middle joints of your fingers, and are known as Heberdon nodes when they happen in the distal joints of your hands.

In a minority of cases, the pain does not stop. If such occurs, you should see your doctor, as treatment is indicated. The first step is to make sure you do not have rheumatoid arthritis which can present in a similar manner. Physical examination of your hands, and noting the firmness of your hand joints usually suffices to establish you have Heberdon or bouchard nodes. Therapy with anti-inflammatory medication or joint injection will control the pain. In time, the inflammation resolves and you no longer need treatment.
