Bring one cup of soil to a participating retailer. The \$12 fee includes basic nutrient test, organic matter analysis, pH, and transportation to the MSU laboratory. A written analysis is sent to the customer by early May. Participating stores in southeast Oakland County

John Alken coined a phrase, modern mission style, to describe the house and the way it is furnished. He explains this as including a little bit each of Frank Lloyd Wright, mission, Arts and Crafts and contemporary elements.

Among its features are 30-degree angles, in steps, corrers and where wall and celling meet. Tiny square inlays are decorative touches in furniture and on surfaces.

## DINING ROOM

The addition, which is now the dining room, is a modern mission showcase. It allows views of part of the 1-3/4 acres of the property on three sides.

On either side of this piece is a vertical Anderson window topped with a Frank Lloyd Wright

### WOODWORKING SHOP

The 400-square-foot woodworking shop is below the dining mom.

It features special electrical outlets, noise insulation and a central vacuum system that keeps the wood dust out of other areas in the house.
