Land use committee starts work

Area residents will get their chance next week to speak up about urban sprawl and the rapid loss of open space to

rapid loss of open space to development. The Michigan Land Use Leadership Council, formed by Gov. Jennifer Granholm, will be holding a public hearing at the Oakland County Board of Commissioners Auditorium Monday. It will be one of six hearings the council will hold statewide in April. Granholm formed the council as one of her first acts as governor, because of her concern about urban sprawl. She is hoping the council can find a way to balance the need for economic growth with the necessity of cuthing the loss of open space.

"Among the results I look for from this council is finding a way for us to preserve our nat-ural treasures while promoting ural treasures while promound economic growth in our state. We must strike a balance, and the cooperation and consensus of the stakeholders around this table will be keys to our success," Granholm said last month.

The council is composed of 26 members, who represent a

There are both Democrat and Republican state lawmakers, as well as environmentalists such as Lana Pollock of the Michigan Environmental Council, and development proponents, like Gil White of the Michigan Association of Realtors.

The council is co-chaired by former governor William Miliken and former attorney general Frank Kelley.

Johnson represents many of the most rural Oakland County townships, including Addison, Brandon, Orion and Oxford, where land use issues are hot topics. Those areas are starting to see the growth that has been a hig part of other Oakland County worm untities for reveral decades.

Oakland County wasn't originally scheduled to have any hearings, but I requested that we have almost every type of hand issue you can have, said Johnson, who will altend the hearing Monday.

Johnson said the council will deal with a rumber of issues, including urban revitalization, the preservation of open space and land-based industries like farming, conomic policies placed to infrastructure, and regional coordination of planning. In the end, the goal is to come up with zew land use laws.

The public hearings are a way for residents and local public officials to add something to the debate. Johnson said cuncul members are looking for 'both concerns and ideas."

Johnson said it is critical for the state's recidents to play a part in the process and have a land in shapping the future of land use issues. She hopes people will take advantage of the opportunity by appearing at one of the hearings.

The Oskland County Board of Commissioners Auditorium is located at 1200 N. Telegraph Road in Pontlac. There will be two separate bearing limes, from 3-5 p.m. and again from 6:30-8:30 p.m.
