"It's non-traditional theater as far as we have no season," said Radelif. "We're here to promote new works for stage. In addition to the marathon we're holding a play writing retreat May 30 at Oaldand University in Rochester. We want to nurture and promote local playwrights. 13 of 23 plays are by Michigan writers. There are four plays an hour except for one hour that's shorter to allow for a (5:30 p.m.) pot luck reception at which everyone's welcome. Each play is done twice. Come at noon and see all the plays, or come at 6:30 p.m. You can buy tickets by the hour or a full day pass for \$40.

There are dramas, comedies, satires, realistic, more theatrical and device driven. There are short plays, some more like skits. It's a great showcase for writers, actors, directors. We encourage people to come. We don't generally recommend the day for children because there are some adult thermes."
