# Madonna athletes nab awards

Although Madonna's baseball and softball teams had contrasting seasons, they were both rewarded for their effort on and off the field.

Thirteen Crusaders were named to All-Volunteer-Hooder Athletic Conference teams, while another six were selected All-Academic team in the WHAC.

On the softball side, Jennifer Tenyer, Arin Fowler and Sarah Golob earned first-team All-WHAC accolades.

Tenyer paced the team in wins, with a 16-8 record and a 2.09 ERA. Tenyer ends her Madonna career as the school leader in every pitching category. Golob, in her first year with the Crusaders, went 14-7, posting a 2.77 ERA with 111 strikeouts. She was also

fourth on the team in hitting with a .325 average. Fowler led the team in hitting with a .359 average and knocked in 21 RBI.

Krystle Shinn and Mary Wardhus (Clarkston) were both honorable mention All-Conference selections.

After making honorable mention last season, Chris Woodruff (Redford Catholic Central) made the WHAC All-Conference team in 2002, batting .325 with 19 extra base hits. Sterling Minter made honorable mention last year at the plate, but earned WHAC All-Conference honors this season from the mound.

The 6-foot-6 hurler posted a 1.99 ERA in 40.2 innings, striking out 35. Mark Cole (CC), Matt Rigley

(Redford Union), Joe Greene, Mario D'Herin (CC), Joel Halliday (RU) and Adam Kline (CC) were all named honorable mention.

Three Crusaders from each team were rewarded for their classroom efforts.

Dave Nester earned a 3.5 grade-point average in Pre-Medicine; D'Herin a 3.3 GPA in English; and Woodruff a 3.6 GPA in Business.

As for the softball team, Lindsay Basko posted a 3.4 GPA in Computer Information Systems; Tenyer a 3.5 GPA in Criminal Justice; and Fowler a 3.7 GPA in Marketing.

Madonna University also placed fifth in the WHAC 2002-03 All-Sports Trophy Tabulation.

The Crusaders finished with 37 points, 10 points behind conference leader Aquinas.

"She was a real standout for us," the coach added. The Raiders battle Berkley tonight in a 7 p.m. start.

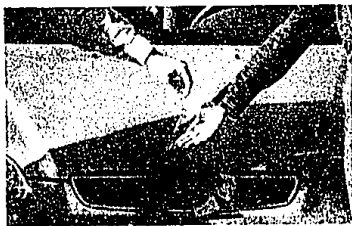
## HARRISON TAKES 4-0 LOSS
