## Race Through The Paper!

Here are some activities that you can do to continue to get familiar with the paper:

1. Numbers Race-tear through the pages of your O & E newspaper and find all of the numbers from 1-25.
2. Advertisers are charged by the number of columns an ad is wide times the height of the ad in inches. Find 3 different sized ads in the paper (don't use the classifieds for this exercise). Measure them and multiply the number of inches times the height of the ad. Multiply that first number times \$10. Then by \$25. Then by \$40.
3. Go through the classified ads and find 8 items that are selling for under \$20.
4. Count the number of pages in the paper that have automobile advertisements on them.
5. Count the number of advertising inserts (the pull-outs which don't contain any news) inside today's paper. Discuss with your class the reasons why a newspaper would include inserts inside their papers.
6. Add all up all of the editorial articles in today's paper and discuss the importance of why editorials are included in the paper.
