White and Ficano agreed the area is in desperate need of a regional transportation system. "If we want to be a first-class region, we've got to have public transportation," Ficano said.

The state's financial condition was also a topic, but leaders said their respective communities have managed to keep up services without raising taxes.

Kilpatrick said Detroit is getting their "financial house in order."

He said combining services

such as department mechanics under one roof for all eity vehicles is a positive step. Were trying to do everything we can to reduce costs and spending. Likewise, Fatterson said the county is doing its best to maintain services by holding tight to a hinting freeze.

Leaders closed the discussion by agreeing to work together for the betterment of the region.
