The Republicans of Oakland county held their convention at the court house in Pontiac Tuesday for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention. They listened to a stirring speech by Dr. Guillot, who attended the national convention in Chicago.

The meeting was called to order by County Chairman Young, who read the official call. Harry McCracken of Farmington was elected temporary chairman, and Frank Codling, temporary secretary. Three committees were appointed of five members each as follows: Credentials—Ross Thompson, Col. Benjamin, A. H. Austin, William Collins and Samuel Morgan. Permanent organization—A. L. Ross, Jay Secord, Wm. A. Patterson, T. D. Seeley and S. S. Crohn. Resolutions—W. D. Clizbe, E. A. Hill, James Gordon, Roy Cowdin and Joseph Stanaback.

Dr. Guillot's remarks were mostly in regard to the national convention at Chicago. He talked of the contest over the seating of delegates and stated that the votes of the people were not molested in any way and that in his judgment the proper delegates were seated. He stated that a vote for Roosevelt is one-half a vote for Wilson and urged the farmers and laboring men to vote the Republican ticket in order to preserve the good times. He spoke of the good times now and compared them with those under a Democratic administration.

Delegates to the state convention were selected after stirring addresses by Congressman Smith, ex-Gov. Fred M. Warner and Judge Weist. The convention was harmonious in every way and was largely attended.

While fishing in Williams Lake Chas. Lewis, a Pontiac business man, suffered a sunstroke and fell into the water. The man was saved from drowning by Frank H. Dohany, the Detroit attorney, who was with him and who finally succeeded, after a desperate struggle, in which the delirious man sank three times, in holding the victim's head above water until help arrived. Lewis is a large man and struggled violently, but Dohany held him for nearly half an hour before some farm hands, hearing his call for help, came to his assistance.
