Stoorman also founded Students Against Intolerance, and spends time educating freshmen at Berkley about tolerance issues, a subject she learned about personally during March of the Living, a 2001 educational trip to Poland and Israel for teenagers.

"Stepping off the plane onto Polish soil, I did not think for once second that we would be treated any differently as Jews," she said in her application essay to the NCJW. "I should have thought twice."

Stoorman likes to travel, documenting her journeys through photography. But filmmaking, she said, is her passion.

Throughout her high school

years she has produced, directed and edited a number of films, including several about the Holocaust.

"My big dream is to be a television producer," she said, "either with MTV or CNN. I know those are very different, but I'm interested in both kinds of programming."

Stoorman will spend the summer working with young children through Huntington Woods Parks and Recreation, and this fall she'll head for Emerson College in Boston, a school dedicated exclusively to

communication and the arts. Nominated by Adat Shalom in Farmington Hills, Teicher currently serves as Michigan regional president of the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization and chapter newspaper editor. He is co-editor-in-chief of Spectrum, West Bloomfield High School's newsmagazine, where he also serves as senior class vice-president.

Teicher has twice traveled to Bulgaria as a B'nai B'rith ambassador. Like Stoorman, he encountered intolerance first hand.

"Although the country has always been very welcoming to Jews, there is a growing base of anti-Semitism developing," he said in his application essay. "I observed a swelling disgust of Jews that not only disturbed me but forced me to rethink my philosophy of life."

His experiences overseas, he said, prompted him to join the effort to eliminate bigotry and hatred in the world.

Teicher will attend the University of Michigan in the fall, but has not yet decided on a major.

His interests are diverse, and he's contemplating a career in business, political science or medicine.

"Whatever profession I go into I'd like to give back to my community and always be a part of it," he said. "That's a very important part of my life."

All 19 applicants received two books, and each of the 17 runners-up received a check for \$100. Money for all awards was donated by Betty and Grant Silverfort.

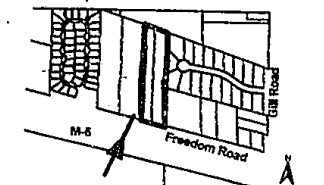

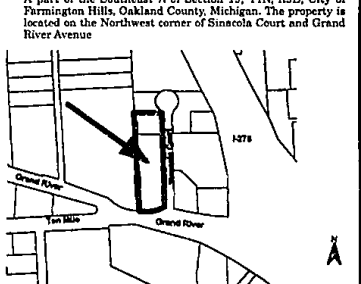

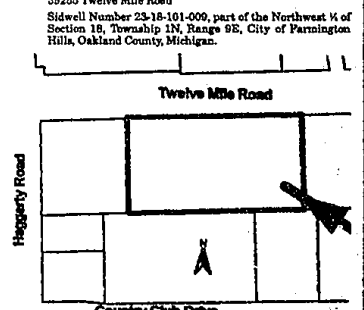
