# Rouge volunteers clean and learn

Volunteers donned grubby clothes and protective gloves last Saturday morning to celebrate and clean the Rouge River and its watershed.
Friends of the Rouge 87th Rouge Rescuel River Day attracted more than 1,000 volunteers to 23 sites in Wayne and Oakland counties, accord-

ing to FOTR Managing Director Carolyne Foster-McCaughey. "All feedback has been really An feedback has been ready positive," said Foster-McCaughey. "Volunteers had a great time and were really enthusiastic."

REDEFINING REMOVAL

For the second year, log jams and woody debris were selec-

tively removed from the Rouge.
"It used to be that when there were trees and log jams in the water wed send in groups with chainsaws to take them out," asid Bob Patterson, a community development specialist for the City of Westland. "What we found was that by clearing everything out the water was flowing too fast and eroding the banks of the river."

Woody debris is now man-

nged and left in as natural a state as possible. In Livonia, 80 volunteers worked at Tarabusi Creek, where a 25-foot long by 10-foot wide channel was cleared through fallen logs and brouble.

They have to be very precise in breaking it open (and) redistributing the wood along the banks where there's signs of croston," said Sharon Sabat,

### Moffitt up for **SEMCOG** vice chair position
