West Ottawa (31-4) made the most of its first title-game appearance.

The Panthers, who defeated top-ranked Jenison in the regionals after losing both games of a doubleheader to the Wildcats late in the regular season, took control with a pair of unearned runs in the bottom of the first inning.

Junior shortstop Brian Baker put down a well-placed drag bunt for a single and one out later.

Scotty Hill reached on an error. Senior left-hander Matt Petry struck out cleanup hitter Norbie Reyes, but catcher Brian Overway and Nykerk followed with RBI singles to give West Ottawa a 2-0 lead.

The Panthers chased Petry (10-1) in the bottom of the second.

Petry, who had eight complete games and a minuscule 0.34 earned-run average, yielded leadoff singles to C.J. VanWieren and Dan Kleinm. VanWieren stole third and scored West Ottawa's third run on a fielder's choice by Baker.

Starting shortstop Dan Lentz took the mound after Petry hit Nate Reyes with a pitch and retired the next two batters on grounders to escape a second-and-third jam.

"I think these guys definitely swung the bat better than Fort Huron Northern, taking nothing away from Northern," Riker said in reference to Petry's complete-game effort in the quarterfinals.

"I think Matt had good stuff; again he was ahead in the count in certain situations, but sometimes you've got to say, 'Hey, they beat our best and hats off to them.'"

Lentz was effective in 3 2/3 innings of relief, allowing one run, two hits and a walk, but Brother Rice's high-powered offense sputtered much of the afternoon.

The Warriors stranded a runner in the third inning and two runners in the second, fourth, sixth and seventh innings. Nykerk scattered eight hits over seven innings with five strikeouts and one walk.

their pitcher," Riker said. "He really stepped it up and got the outs when he needed it, just like Mike Kirschheiter did for us (in Rice's semifinal win over Portage Central)."

"Nykerk buckled down when he needed to and hats off to him. He pitched a great game today and hats off to Ottawa. They were a better team than us today."

"If we could have got one or two more hits in timely situations, it would have made a big difference," he added. "And that's what they got. They got some timely hits and, early on against Matt, they weren't fooled too much."

"They came out and put the pressure on us defensively. They pushed a few across early, and then we were scrambling from behind the whole time after that."

Brother Rice manufactured a run in the top of the fourth without the benefit of a hit. Junior catcher Doug Pickens reached first on an error, advanced to second on a passed ball, moved to third on Cody Nolan's groundout, and scored when VanWieren booted Max Kelmigian's grounder at third base.

The Warriors used a two-out rally in the fifth to close within 3-2. Petry, who went 3-for-4 and scored a run, singled to center and moved to second on Pickens' single.

Nykerk then uncorked two wild pitches and Petry came around to score.

West Ottawa stretched its lead to 5-2 with single runs in the fifth and sixth innings on RBI singles by Nykerk and

Sommavilla.

Brother Rice didn't go quiet by its last at-bat. The Warriors put two runners on with two outs - Petry slammed a ground-rule double and Nolan walked on a full-count pitch - but Kelmigian hit a fly to left fielder Justin Caserta for the final out.

Steve Antoniolli and Vytas Ray contributed two hits apiece to Brother Rice's eight-hit attack, and Pickens went 1-for-4 with a run scored.

Baker had two hits, scored twice and drove in a run, and Nykerk went 2-for-3 with two RBI for the Panthers.

The Warriors lost to only three teams this season. The others were Chicago Brother Rice in a doubleheader and Dearborn Divine Child in the Catholic League final, 1-0.

"They know people are going to come after you because you play at Rice, and you're going to always have to play your best," Riker said.

"They learned that early on in their careers, so when they were juniors and seniors they knew what they had to do to finish as a champion. And they fell a little short, but I think they'll grow and they're going to better people for it."

"These guys have a special place in my heart, because some of them played four years for me. That's what hurts."

Brother Rice will be a team to watch next season since seven players who saw action Saturday are underclassmen. That includes Pickens, who led the Warriors in most offensive categories. He had 11 home runs and 55 RBI.

Errors cost Post 346 in loss to Chief Pontiac

Chief Pontiac scored five unearned runs and rallied to defeat visiting Farmington Post 346 in an American Legion baseball game Monday, 5-4.

Farmington had a 4-2 lead, but Pontiac scored twice in the bottom of the fifth to tie and once in the sixth to win it.

Pontiac scored the deciding runs with the help of two errors and a groundout. Post 346 had a total of six errors.

Farmington (5-2) scored the first run of the game on Justin Droste's RBI groundout in the second inning.

Post 346 regained the lead, 3-2, with two runs in the fourth. Danny Doig had an RBI single and scored the go-ahead run on an error on a ball hit by Dan Williams.

Pontiac scored a two-run lead in the fifth when Andy Brown doubled and scored on Chris Chesney's single.

Andy Brown pitched all six innings, allowing six hits and one walk while striking out three.

On Sunday, Farmington split a doubleheader and a pair of slugfests with host Berkley, winning the first game, 19-9,

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and losing the second, 18-13.

Chesney hit a grand slam and was 3-for-5 with six RBI in the opener. Droste also was 3-for-5 with a double; he drove in five runs and scored three.

Mike Kish and Brian Butler were 2-for-2. Kish hit a two-run homer and had four RBI; Butler had four runs and had two RBI.

Farmington had 13 hits and received 15 walks. Jake Ghannam also had two hits and two RBI, and Dave Justice scored three runs.

Joe James was the winning pitcher in relief. Over the final four innings, he limited Berkley to one run on two hits and a walk. He struck out six.

In the nightcap, Farmington had an 8-2 lead after four innings but gave up 16 Berkley runs in the last three innings.

Farmington was still on top going into the seventh, 12-10, but Berkley scored eight runs in the top half to take the lead.

Bobby Houchins was 3-for-4 with four RBI. His run-homer gave Farmington a 12-10 lead.

Eric Zatzkin, Ghannam and Butler had two hits and two

RBI apiece. Droste extended his hitting streak to six games.

On Friday, Brown recorded 12 strikeouts and pitched Farmington to a 12-5 victory over visiting Royal Oak. He scattered six hits over seven innings and walked one.

Farmington led 5-0 after two innings and added five more runs in the bottom of the fourth for a 10-1 lead.

Ghannam, who had two hits and four RBI, and Houchins hit two-run homers.

Chesney and Brown also had two hits apiece; Chesney knocked in three runs and Brown one.

Post 346 is idle until Saturday when it plays a doubleheader at Auburn Hills.

"The Green Machine hasn't sputtered, but we put some holes in its defense with some leaks," Farmington coach Wally Christensen said.

"If not for some walks and errors, we'd be 7-0 right now."

"Brown had tough time (Monday). In three innings, it took four outs to get them out and that really hurt. But we played a good team. Chief Pontiac is an excellent team."
