### Bus Service Is Planned

ing proposition for the present, at least. Efforts are also being made to interest Farmington business and professional men in additional pledges, to make the bus-rider, good for ten cents in trade at Farmington stores, on purchases of two dollars and upward. The bus-rider would thus, by taking advantage of the tie-in, have their transportation Tuesday evening. No official ac-

tion Farmington free. It has not been decided whether this will be attempted.

Leroy K. Fleming and F. De Vere Fleming are working on the establishment of the bus service, which would be operated by the former. As planned at present, operation would be for about twelve hours a day, probably from 8 o'clock in the morning until 8 o'clock at night.

This and other possible addition or changes will not be acted upon until operation gives an opportunity for judging the needs of the territories concerned.
