Toxin-Anti-Toxin To Be Given In Schools

out a plan whereby the school children and pre-school children of neighborhood families may receive the treatment in different schools in the county.

The difficulty of reaching each of the two hundred schools in the county will be overcome by designating a number of centrally located schools as clinic centers to which the children from surrounding schools can be taken and returned after Toxin-antitoxin County bus will be used for transporting the children.

Sixty-five schools have requested that Toxin-antitoxin be given. All principals and teachers desiring to have Toxin-antitoxin clinics are urged to communicate at once with the Oakland County Department of Health with plans are still incomplete, other wise they cannot be included for this year.

Miss Lucille Dowsett, Clarenceville school nurse, on Wednesday

issued the following statement in regard to a toxin-antitoxin campaign.

"Every year hundreds of Michigan children needlessly die from diphtheria. We are beginning an active campaign to check this waste of human lives and we hope to make diphtheria in Michigan a disease of ancient history. If the parents and guardians of the State are willing to assist us by seeing that every child receives protection, this can be accomplished."

"Some of the children in our school have had the Toxin-antitoxin and the Schick test before this and are protected, others have had the toxin-antitoxin but have never had the Schick test afterwards; these should have the test now to determine whether they are fully protected or not; still others have never had either the toxin-antitoxin or the Schick test. These should be taken care

of now. On Monday afternoon, February 4 the toxin-antitoxin campaign is to begin. During this past week permission slips have been sent to every home. If you haven't already returned the ones sent to your home will you please do so at once?"

"We are very anxious to have the younger children protected too, so will you bring any younger ones to the Clarenceville Central School on the Base Line (eight-mile) road, on Monday at 1 p. m. February 4?"

"Your whole-hearted co-operation in this will be greatly appreciated."
