## "BIRD WEEK" PROCLAIMED BY FARMINGTON MAYOR

Next week, April 8 to 15, has been designated by Mayor Wells D. Butterfield as "Bird Week" in Farmington in conformity with the movement throughout the State for choosing a State bird for Michigan this Spring. Residents are asked to send their votes to the Michigan Audubon Society at Hart, Mich., indicating their choice for a State bird.

Mrs. Edith Munger of the State organization was in Farmington Monday on a tour about the State in the interest of the State bird selection. A bird-house exhibit may be arranged in this community in the near future.

## USE OF FIREWORKS IS BANNED IN MICHIGAN

Farmington city officials this week asked that attention be called to the recently-passed Espie Bill, which has been approved by the State Legislature and Governor Fred W. Green, prohibiting the sale or shooting of fireworks by individuals anywhere in the State.

The use of fireworks is restricted to cities or villages, or groups such as lodges, the latter being required to obtain a permit from the local governing body. The law is effective now.

## IMPROVEMENT IN ROADS IN TOWNSHIP IS ASKED

## THREE EXCHANGE CLUBS GATHER AT A BANQUET HERE

Farmington, Milford And Walled  
Lake Groups Have First  
Event Together

Commercial passenger airplanes will soon be flying 200 miles an hour and at a height of 40,000 feet, with automatic steering devices which will make the course to destination as certain as railroad travel according to Major E. J. Hinkle of Detroit who spoke at the joint meeting of Farmington, Walled Lake, and Milford Exchange Clubs at Farmington Junction Thursday evening.

Major Hinkle was a member of the famous Lafayette Escadrille during the World War.

"You cannot forecast aviation," said Major Hinkle. "Your wildest dreams of today may be on the market commercially within a year. The greatest needs now are

landing fields, a place in every community where a man can get down on the ground when he has to."

Aviation is safer than is believed, Major Hinkle said, because the motor and railroad accidents are not given the same amount of publicity as aviation mishaps. He cited one record of only one death for every million miles flown on passenger routes.

Charles Hutton of Walled Lake was chairman of the committee in charge, introduced Charles E. Hayes of Detroit, who acted as toastmaster. Music was provided by the "Junior Hawaiian Trio," of Station WGHM and Donald Monteath, all of Detroit.

Grant Scott, past president of the Detroit Council of Exchange Clubs, spoke on "the broadening influence of Exchange."

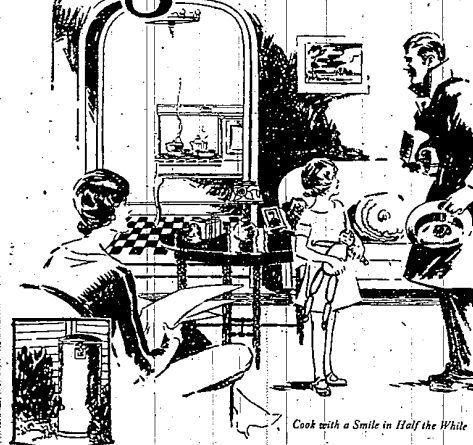
