FARMINGTON DEALERS PARTICIPATE IN SPRING SHOW OF MOTOR CARS

A nation-wide exhibition of all General Motors passenger cars, to take place during the week beginning April 20th and ending April 27th, is an innovation announced by Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president, General Motors. The exhibition is to be known as the General Motors Spring Showing, and from the plans already outlined promises to be the largest and most comprehensive showing in the history of the automotive industry. Farmington Motor Sales, Oakland-Pontiac Sales and George K. Checketts, Farmington Chevrolet, Oakland-Pontiac, and Buick dealers, will cooperate in the event.

Twenty-three thousand General Motors dealers are to participate in the event each acting as an individual exhibitor of the line of cars he merchandises in his particular location. Allotting a minimum of five display cars for each dealer, this will mean that during the week more than 125,000 General Motors cars will be on view simultaneously. The event will be suitably announced by nationwide magazine, newspaper and outdoor advertising.

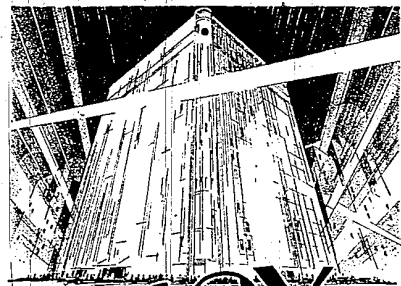
KELVINATOR REPORTS MARCH BIGGEST MONTH
