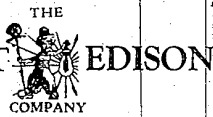

Poultry management, poultry houses, poultry diseases, brooding and incubation, and gymnasium are among the subjects offered.

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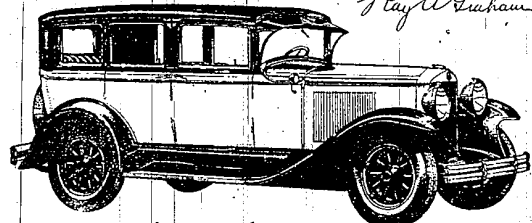
