Eugenia Regentik will exhibit her second year work in the clothing project while Alice Angell also of West Farmington will exhibit her first year work. Edna McGregor of the Homer School and Margaret Killing of the Nichols Schools will also compete for first honors. Due to illness in the Novi schools, their champion has not yet been selected.

The morning will be devoted to the exhibits, the music memory contest, the examinations for the health champion, games for the girls led by Miss Ruth Kimball of the Pontiac City Recreation Department and for the boys by Melvin Avery, associate leader of Boys and Girls Clubs.

A parade of the grounds will open the afternoon program followed by the roll call of clubs by Mr. H. M. Vaughn, County Agricultural Agent, to which each club will give an appropriate response. Two plays, one by the Poppleton girls and one by the Poppleton boys and a quartette from Elmwood School.

**WAR VETERANS URGED  
TO FILE BONUS CLAIMS**

The following message is addressed to World War veterans and survivors of deceased veterans by Congressman Grant M. Hudson:

Approximately 400,000 veterans of the World War have failed to file application for Adjusted Service Certificates commonly known as the Bonus. The time within for these applications will expire during this year.

All enlisted men who served more than sixty days are entitled to the Bonus, dependent on the length of service. Veterans who have not filed application should do so now.

If a veteran died either before or since the enactment of this law without making application, then the widow or children or the dependent mother or father of the veteran may do so now.

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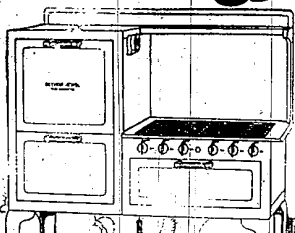
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
