Graham-Paige production in April broke all records for one month's output with a total of 13,500 cars. Production for the first four months of the year puts Graham-Paige 72 per cent ahead of the same period last year, with a total of 35,334 cars, a gain of 15,434.

As compared with March, the April production showed an increase of 1940 cars, or 20 per cent.

Orders already on hand for May shipment total 13,500.

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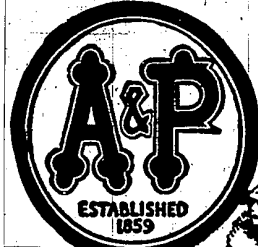
