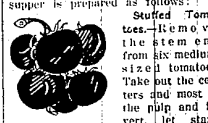

### CULINARY KINKS

A delightful dish for luncheon or supper is prepared as follows:



Sautéed Tomatoes.—Remove the stem end from six medium-sized tomatoes. Take out the centers and most of the pulp and invert, let stand twenty minutes. Cook three tablespoons of butter with six tablespoons of chopped green pepper five minutes. Add three-fourths of a cupful of soft bread crumbs, one-half cupful of the removed pulp, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, pepper to taste and a little onion juice. Fill the tomatoes with the mixture and bake fifteen minutes.

Baked Larded Liver.—Skewer, tie and lard the upper surface of a calf's liver. Place in a baking pan and spread with the following: Cream, three tablespoonsful of butter and add one and one-fourth teaspoonfuls of salt, one-half teaspoonful each of cloves and pepper. Pour around one-half cupful of boiling water and cook in a moderate oven one hour, basting every ten minutes. Remove, slicing dish, skim off the fat from the pan and add one cupful of orange juice and strain the sauce over the liver.

Scalloped Potatoes With Ham.—With a very small amount of cold cooked ham, sliced thin or put through the meat grinder, arrange a layer of thinly sliced potatoes, then a sprinkling of shredded onion and a layer of ham; repeat until all is used. Cover with sauce milk and put covered into a moderate oven. Bake until the potatoes are tender. Serve from the dish.

Fruit Jelly.—Soak two tablespoonsful of granulated gelatin in one-half cupful of cold water, dissolve in one and two-thirds cupfuls of boiling water; add one cupful of sugar, one cupful of grapejuice, one-third of a cupful of orange juice, three tablespoonsful of lemon juice, straw and mold. Chill and cut in cubes to serve as garnish.

Moved by Gullen, seconded by Macomber, that the salary of Elmer Shaw, janitor of grade building, be \$1350 per year. Carried.

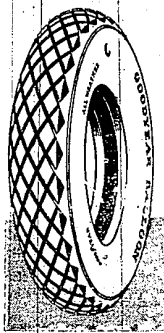
Moved by Macomber, seconded by Gullen, that E. W. Palmer be paid \$65 per month for driving school bus for remainder of year. Carried.

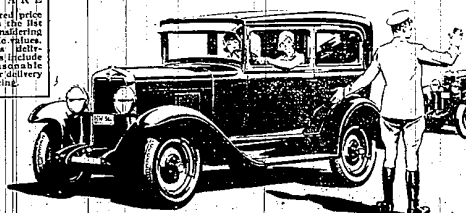
