Nine cents a quartit now costs the good peo-ple of Detroit which is one cent higher than it was when at the highest point last year. That's a big price to pay for milk and the vorst feature of the deal is that the rich milk dealers in the city get far more than their share in the in-Only a fraction of the one cent advance goes to the farmer.
