Use "catch' crops where possible. If a regular crop has been removed fairly early in the fall and the succeeding crop is not to be planted the following spring, it is always worth while to seed the land to cats or rye or vetch. Prequently it will be found desirable and profitable just before the last callutation of the corn to seed the corn field to winter vetch seed at the rate of 39 pounds per acre. The field may be seeded to cats or rye instead. The benefits to be derived from the catch crop are at least three.

MANAGEMENT OF SANDY SOILS WEED CONTROL IN AUTUMN

EXHAUSTION OF THE SOIL

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Prof. E. H. Parrington of Wisconsin Agricultural College, in speaking of Soil Exhaustion, made a very interesting statement regarding the seiling of dairy products from the farm as compared with seiling the grain productions directly off the farm. Here is what he says:

"There is a great difference in the amount of soil fertility removed from the farm by selling crops as compared with the seiling of cream and butter. The constituents of the soil that become most easily exhausted by farm ling operations are then introgen, the phosphoric acid and the polash. "An analysis of different crops and of milk, butter and cheese will show how much of these various constituents are removed from the farm when a ceitain quantity of kheese products are soid. "Dalrying keeps up the fertility of the soil as already explained.
"Skimmilk is very valuable to the farmer not only for the reasons given, but because it is profitable for a farmer to become a stock raisor—that is, raise calves, pigs, poultry, etc., rather than a crop producer and a seller of grain.


