Community Hall Is
Dedicated At Wixom

The dedication of the Wixom Community Hall on Friday evening culminates a year of hard work by the members of the Community Hall Association.

The building, of steel supports and cement blocks, with a face brick front, is completed at a cost of approximately \$6500.00. The building is 40 feet wide and 70 feet long with a basement under the entire building, which will be used for banquet purposes, the first banquet to be the dedication banquet.

As you enter the door at the front, stairs go up to the auditorium and down to the basement. At the back of the hall is a stage. Folding chairs have been secured for seating purposes. A back stairway goes from the basement to the stage.

The building is being paid for by subscription. Last fall after many delays, Judd Furman and R. D. Stephens got hold of scrap-iron and a hoe was started to dig the basement and the start of the building had begun. Steel windows and beams were furnished by F. J. Schmidt.

As is usual in a project of this kind the women have been very active. The Wixom Community League Auxiliary has furnished the hall with silverware, dishes, stoves, aluminum and a piano. The officers of the league are: president, Mrs. R. D. Stephens; first vice-president, Mrs. B. A. Kitson; second vice-president, Mrs. Frank McDonald; secretary, Mrs. Charles Johnson; treasurer, Mrs. Martha Furman.

The work committee is, Mrs. James Gibson, Mrs. Rachel Palmer and Mrs. Carl Oldenburgh.

Gas Runs Out, Reform
School Boy Is Caught

Carl Dargis, Walled Lake boy, who has given the authorities a good deal of trouble in his few years, has been captured at Caro in a car reported stolen from the Oakland factory at Pontiac, and is now back in the State Industrial School at Lansing. The boy had escaped from the institution some time ago.

It is stated the boy told of stealing a horse from the Keego Harbor riding stable and riding to the barn on the Richardson farm on Straits Lake. He turned the horse out to pasture and during the night the animal got away. His story was substantiated by the finding of the saddle in the barn.

The next day Carl went to the farmhouse of Joseph Ruminiski, where he outfitted himself in clothes belonging to Mr. Ruminiski, a suit, overcoat, shoes, shirt, necktie and hat and then made his way to an abandoned gravel pit where he burned his khaki uniform.

He made his way to Pontiac, it is reported, stole the car but ran out of gasoline at Caro, where he was arrested and held.

Cecil Rhodes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis J. Rhoades, died suddenly Thursday at the home of his parents on the Devereaux farm three miles from Walled Lake.

Cecil, age twelve, was taken ill on Friday of last week with a severe vomiting and was in bed all week. He seemed slightly better on Thursday and was able to eat a small amount of food. Shortly after he became violently ill and they called a doctor but death came shortly after the physician arrived.

Cecil was born in Davisburg on February 14, 1927. He was in the seventh grade at school. His parents and one brother, Carl, survive.

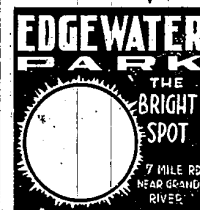
