The smaller city dailies and country weeklies are the great medium for reaching the masses of the people who represent the majority of the reading and buying power of this nation.—The Manufacturer.

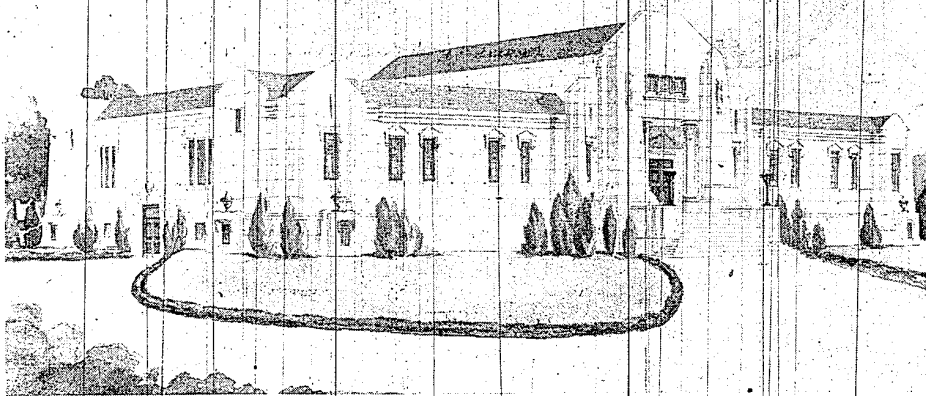
GRAHAM-PAIGE WINS
