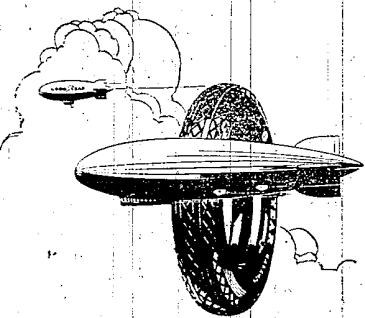


LAKESIDE LODGE HAS

PAVING PETITIONS FOR  
WALLED LAKE-NOVI RD.  
TO BE PRESENTED SOON

Acting upon the suggestion of Max Hagelstine supervisor from Royal Oak and a member of the road committee, the Walled Lake Exchange Club will circulate petitions to be presented to the Board of Supervisors at their June meeting asking that the gap from the end of Maple road to Grand River road at Novi be paved.

Luther D. Allen, chairman of the Oakland County Road Commission and Isaac Bond, road commissioner, three members of the road committee of the Board of Supervisors, Chairman Bart J. Wardlow, C. A. Hamilton and Mr. Hagelstine and Joseph A. Long and Rep. P. J. Miller, were invited to attend the meeting of the club on Tuesday to help them plan for some definite action on the road.

Considerable discussion took place regarding the road and traffic, the manner of paving and the question as to whether or not the four-mile stretch is a "gap."

In regard to the maintenance of County roads he said the cost averaged about \$700 per mile. He also asked Rep. Miller about the constitutionality of the amendment to the law and was told by Mr. Miller that it had been approved by numerous legal authorities in the State government.

Chairman Allen was doubtful if the four miles was really a "gap" as interpreted by law. He stated the road was one of the most dangerous and expensive roads to maintain in the county. He stated later that the proposed charge of 10 per cent on roads built under the amended gap law would hardly pay for the spreading of the tax on the rolls.

The census of the Walled Lake Consolidated School district reveals 938 children in the district. Twenty-six families have removed from the school district, taking 60 children with them and 27 new families have entered the district, bringing 60 children. The present number of pupils at the school is 322.

Mrs. J. C. Ellenwood has just completed taking the census.

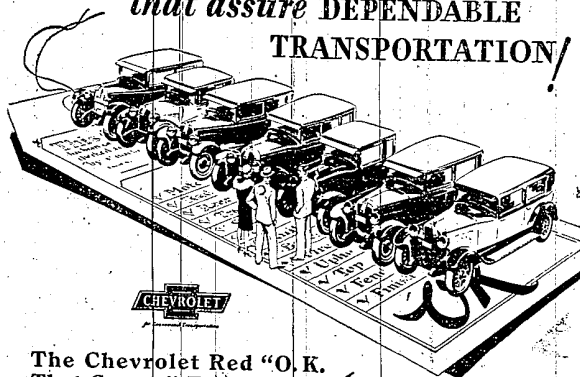
