

VIGOROUS EFFORT FOR NOVI-WALLED LAKE RD. PAVING IS BEING MADE

Paving of the Walled Lake-Novi road to the 12-mile road under the Covert Act or an attempt to pave it under the "gap-law" all the way to Grand River was the aim of a meeting of residents of the road with Road Commissioner Isaac Bond and the Walled Lake Exchange Club in the club rooms last Thursday. About sixty people from Novi including Supervisor Charles W. Hamilton were present. The sentiment of those present from Novi was that they wanted the road paved but they wanted someone else to pay for it.

Figures presented indicated the cost would be only \$1 per acre per year and \$1.25 per lot per year, possibly less.

Mr. Bond had met with the Exchange Club Tuesday evening. Those present were united on the advisability of having the road paved under the Covert Law all the way to Grand River as the quickest, surest and best way. In order to give everyone interested an opportunity to ascertain the cost and manner of paving, the meeting Thursday was held.

A. R. Green, a member of the Exchange committee, who have been investigating the cost, gave the figures secured. Basing the cost per mile as \$40,000, the total cost will be \$160,000 for the four miles from Maple road to Grand River. The County Road Commissioners have indicated they will stand 40 per cent. due to the unusual condition of the road and the extremely high cost of maintenance, reported as being about \$2,000 per year.

The Township of Commerce and Novi have indicated they will take 30 per cent to be assessed at large. This leaves 30 per cent or \$48,000 to be paid by the property owners.

Cost Is Computed

Taking an area one-half mile each side of the road there are about 2,000 lots and 2,000 acres. Dividing the cost of the road in equal parts leaves the cost per lot approximately \$12.50 and the cost per acre about \$10, spread over a period of ten years.

Mr. Green explained that the gap law as amended under the bill introduced by P. J. Miller in the last Legislature would have to be investigated as to its constitutionality before it could be used and the time to try it out with a friendly suit would doubtless be a year or more.

Commissioner Bond said that the bonding attorney of the Road Commission had assured them he would not put his approval of the bonds for this road until a suit had been tried to determine the constitutionality of the law. He said the Commission believes this road needed paving more than any road in Oakland County and the cost of maintenance was so high they would be willing to pay higher on this road than they usually do.

Rep. P. J. Miller was called upon to express his opinion of the matter and explained the gap law, quoting the words of the amendment. Supervisor Hamilton asked how many present from Novi were in favor of the road but did not get a response. The cost of dust as it afflicted cars, fruit, houses as well as the nuisance was mentioned.

Speaks For Paving

J. W. Lathrup of Farmington stated he thought the opportunity should not be passed up, that the small cost of the road was not

to be considered in comparison with the benefits. The suggestion was made that without the Detroit people who use the road the section would not be as prosperous as it now is or would real estate be as valuable. A resolution has been drawn up to be presented to the Road Commission for approval and then to be submitted to the Supervisors requesting the paving under the gap law to see what the results will be.

The matter of petitioning for the paving to the 12-mile road and leave the one mile gap, to Grand River is also being considered. Immediate action is necessary as the Supervisors meet on Monday.

William C. King, Commerce Township treasurer and Miss Tressa Bishop were quietly married at Milford on Monday afternoon, June 17.

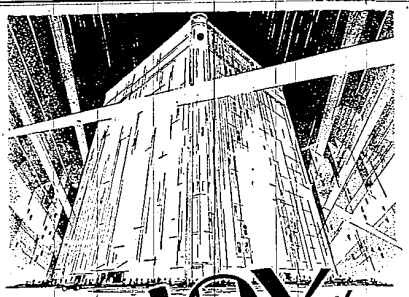
