## LOBSTER DISHES.

Lobsters with the big claws, found on the Atlantic coast north of New Jersey are the choicest of such seafood. The spiny lobster, found on the south Atlantic coast, and the crawfish of the Pacific are all of the same family and have much the same flavor.

**Boiled Lobster**—Sever the connection between the head and body of the lobster with a sharp knife and drop into boiling water. Cook for half an hour. Remove from the water, wipe dry and then rub the shell with a little olive oil.  
To remove the meat, put the lobster feelers down on a board and cut with a sharp paring knife through the lobster, cutting into halves. Remove with a small pointed paring knife the long dark line that runs through the white meat and lift out the filling in the head. All that remains is edible.

**Luncheon Lobster**—Put in a little butter, two cupsful of diced lobster meat, add one cupful of heavy cream and four hard cooked egg yolks blended with two tablespoonsful of butter. Season to taste with pepper and salt and serve on buttered toast or in patty shells.  
**Lobster à la Newburg**—Take one and one-half pounds of lobster meat, heat in two tablespoonsful of butter, salt, paprika to taste and a tablespoonful of lemon juice. Add one beaten egg to a cupful of white sauce, turn in the lobster, cook one minute.
